Session 1A

Mini-Conference for New ORALLians: An Essential Program for First-Time Conference Attendees and New(ish) Law Librarian

This program will benefit anyone wishing to maximize their involvement in ORALL and jump-start their conference experience. The program will start with a brief presentation covering the presenters' best tips for new conference attendees. This will be followed by a panel of speakers who will introduce ORALL and give advice for new members wishing to become more involved in ORALL through activities such as publishing in the newsletter and volunteering for committees.

The second half of the program will be interactive, with icebreakers followed by speed-networking. Like speed-dating, this approach to networking takes away the pressure of the open-ended conversation. Participants will only have a few minutes to converse with their partner before the time is up and they have a new conversation partner. Participants will leave with new acquaintances and can continue to build on these mini-conversations over the course of the conference.

Session 2

Researching ORALL States: Building on the Basics

An overview of what's unique about legal institutions and resources of each of the ORALL states: Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky.

Speakers:

Sara Sampson, Assistant Dean for Information Services, Interim Dean for Communications, Director of the Law Library, and Senior Lecturer, Ohio State University Moritz College of Law

Sara Sampson is the assistant dean for information services, interim dean for communications, director of the law library, and a senior lecturer at The Ohio State University Moritz College of Law. She manages all aspects of information technology, communications, and the library for the College of Law and teaches the required Legal Analysis and Writing I (LAW I) course each year.

Dean Sampson writes and presents on topics related to legal research and writing and library management. She has coordinated teaching workshops for law librarians and regularly speaks at library conferences. Her most recent publications, both co-authored, include an update of an introductory text to Ohio Legal Research, and an article on developing financial literacy in library staff.

She previously served as the deputy director of the law library and clinical assistant professor of law at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and the head of reference and adjunct professor at Georgetown University Law Center in Washington, D.C.

She has taught appellate advocacy, legal writing, legal research skills for practice, advanced legal research, introduction to scholarly note writing, and law librarianship courses.

Dean Sampson has worked for all three branches of the Ohio government. During law school, she spent a summer working at the Ohio Legislative Service Commission and a year working at the Ohio Department of Mental Health's legal department. Before becoming a librarian, she spent five years as a judicial law clerk at the Ohio Fourth District Court of Appeals.

She is a member of the Ohio Bar and Beta Phi Mu, the International Library & Information Studies Honor Society.

Ashley Ahlbrand, Assistant Librarian for Educational Technologies and Adjunct Lecturer in Law, Maurer School of Law, Indiana University Bloomington

Ashley Ahlbrand is the Assistant Librarian for Educational Technologies and Adjunct Lecturer in Law at the Maurer School of Law at Indiana University Bloomington. She joined the law library staff in 2012. In addition to the teaching and reference duties she shares with her colleagues, her role as the educational technologies librarian includes incorporating emerging technologies in the library-related projects, as well as assisting Law School faculty with the use of technology for teaching and learning.

Ahlbrand's research focuses on the use and ethics of existing and emerging technologies in libraries, course curricula, and the legal profession. She is a member of the American Association of Law Libraries, the American Bar Association, the Indiana State Bar Association.

Session 3A **Make Research Great Again: Building Resources and Skills for Researching Election Law**

During a presidential election year, law librarians in the battleground state of Ohio – or any state, really – can reasonably expect to be asked more than a few research questions about election law. This program will cover helpful sources and strategies for researching elections and election law. The Moritz Law Library has collaborated with the Moritz College of Law's Election Law at Moritz program to build information resources and research guides to assist in researching in this area. The speakers will draw upon these efforts and their research experience to provide a general overview of key primary and secondary sources for election law as well as different types of relevant data and statistics that support this type of research. Specific problems and questions in election law research, such as contested elections, historical voting data, and money in politics, will help to illustrate selected online resources.

Speakers:

Matt Cooper, Assistant Director for Public Services, Moritz Law Library

Matt Cooper oversees the public services staff at the Ohio State University's Moritz Law Library, including the circulation and reference departments. He also provides reference services to students, faculty, staff, and other visitors to the law library. Cooper teaches various research and writing courses including Legal Analysis and Writing I to first-year students and Ohio Legal Research to upper division students. He is a licensed attorney, having been a member of the Ohio Bar since 2001. Prior to joining the library, Cooper worked as an assistant public defender in Wilmington, Ohio, representing numerous indigent clients in felony and misdemeanor criminal matters. He also worked as a staff attorney at the Twelfth District Ohio Court of Appeals, assisting judges with legal research and opinion drafting.

Cooper graduated cum laude with a B.A. in history from the University of Notre Dame before receiving a J.D. from The Ohio State University Moritz College of Law. He also earned a Master's degree in library and information science from Kent State University. Cooper is a member of the American Association of Law Libraries, the Ohio Regional Association of Law Libraries, and the Columbus Bar Association.

Paul Gatz, Reference Librarian, Moritz Law Library

Paul Gatz is a reference librarian at The Ohio State University's Moritz Law Library. Paul has also worked at law libraries at Texas Tech University and the University of Illinois. Paul co-wrote an article on free online legal information and the role of the law library in the April 2014 issue of AALL Spectrum and participated as a panelist for a presentation on extracurricular legal research instruction programs at the SWALL Annual Meeting in April of 2015. In Spring 2017, he will be teaching an advanced legal research course focused on litigation and alternative dispute resolution.

Session 3B **DIY Infographics: Adding Visual Appeal Around Your Library**

Serving as an excellent tool to improve the visual appeal of law libraries, infographics can be used to enhance signage and instructions, classroom materials, research guides, and library reports. Rather than exploring the variety of software and platforms available for making infographics, this program will focus on basic graphic design concepts and different approaches for implementing infographics in law libraries. Participants will gain a greater understanding of graphic design principles by viewing and analyzing a variety of examples. Participants will then use those design principles during a guided exercise to create an infographic using a free online platform. This program will be beneficial to any librarian interested in developing infographics or refreshing their current design skills.

Blueprints for Keeping Your Cool

Session 4B

Building Skills to Teach Outside the Research Box: Law Librarians Teaching Legal Writing to 1Ls

The librarians at the Moritz Law Library are in the pool of professors who teach the required fall semester legal writing course “LAW I,” which introduces students to legal institutions and processes, methods of legal analysis, research sources and strategies, professionalism issues that confront new lawyers, and effective communication with clients, colleagues, and other audiences. While the librarians already teach legal research courses, this experience has developed the librarians’ experience teaching legal writing—something that few law school librarians do.

This presentation will focus on what we’ve learned from this unique experience. Specifically, the librarians will discuss helpful resources and successful strategies for teaching writing and analysis skills (especially those that could be incorporated into an advanced legal research course), balancing a skills- and feedback-heavy course with routine library duties, balancing teaching research skills with teaching writing skills, and working collaboratively with legal writing faculty who also teach LAW I.

Session 5B **Assessing Assessment: Using Data from Outcomes-Based Assessment to Build a Better LRW Program**

The new ABA accreditation standards require law schools to create identifiable and measurable learning outcomes that reflect the knowledge, skills, and values a law school desires its students to attain upon completing their course of study, and then to evaluate the degree to which students are attaining competency in those desired learning outcomes, bringing legal education into line with many other disciplines that have found Outcomes-Based-Education (OBE) to be highly beneficial. A major strength of an OBE system is that aggregated data from individual student assessments can be used to evaluate curricular strengths and weaknesses at the course, program or even institutional level, and thus to improve student learning where needed. This program will guide participants through the steps of an outcomes-based assessment process, including: identifying student learning outcomes; measuring student achievement of those outcomes (including by creating grading rubrics appropriate for assessment); analyzing the data obtained from the measures (including converting individual student assessments into usable data sets, and analyzing aggregated outcomes data); and using the results of the analysis to make curricular changes where needed to improve student learning. While the program will focus primarily on how outcomes assessment is used at the course level, the speakers will also relate the process to institutional assessment as contemplated by the new ABA accreditation standards.

Speakers:

Beau Steenken, Instructional Services Librarian, University of Kentucky College of Law

Beau Steenken joined the Law Library Faculty at the University of Kentucky in September 2010.

As

Instructional Services Librarian, he engaged in a revamp of the Legal Research curriculum as the UK

College of Law shifted from an adjunct-model to a full-time faculty model of LRW instruction. He teaches two to four sections of 1L Legal Research a year, Foreign & International Legal Research every other year, and also coordinates informal research instruction of various sorts. Before coming to the

University of Kentucky, he managed to collect a B.A., a J.D., and an M.S.I.S. from the University of Texas, as well as an M.A. in history from Texas State University and an LL.M. in Public International law from the University of Nottingham, where he also took up archery.

Melissa Henke, Robert G. Lawson & William H. Fortune Associate Professor of Law and Director of Legal Research and Writing

Melissa N. Henke is the Robert G. Lawson & William H. Fortune Associate Professor of Law and Director of Legal Research and Writing. Henke teaches legal writing. She is a member of the Legal Writing Institute and the Association of Legal Writing Directors.

Prior to joining UK Law, she was an Associate Professor of Legal Research and Writing at the Georgetown University Law Center. Before she began teaching full-time, Henke practiced law in the Washington, D.C. firm Hogan & Hartson (now Hogan Lovells), where she represented clients in a wide range of commercial litigation matters, including breach of contract and business torts, and defended against nationwide RICO and state class actions involving the healthcare field. In 2007 and 2008, she served as the senior associate in the law firm's premiere *pro bono* practice group, litigating high-impact and individual *pro bono* matters involving civil rights, employment discrimination, wrongful convictions, and immigration. Before joining Hogan & Hartson in 2003, she clerked for Judge Gary Allen Feess of the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California. She also served as an adjunct professor of legal research and writing at the George Washington University Law School in the 2004 and 2006 academic years.

Henke earned her J.D. with highest honors from the George Washington University Law School in 2001, and graduated *summa cum laude* from the University of Kentucky in 1998.

Lori Shaw, Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Professor of Lawyering Skills, University of Dayton School of Law

Lori Shaw serves as associate dean for academic affairs and professor of lawyering skills at the University Of Dayton School Of Law. As associate dean, she determines the curriculum and class schedule, counsels students regarding classes, and oversees the academic functions and general administration of the School of Law. Shaw has been a member of the Legal Profession faculty at the School of Law since 1988.

In 2012, Shaw was named the Title IX Coordinator for the University of Dayton, and was responsible for coordinating the University's compliance that year. Her responsibilities included overseeing all Title IX complaints and identifying and addressing any patterns or systemic problems that arise during the review of such complaints.

She has served as dean of students from 2003-2013 where she worked with and counseled students concerning personal and academic issues. She developed and enforced student policies; served as an advocate for student needs and represented the student body on law school and university committees; and provided leadership for various student programs, organizations, and events. She was also on the management team for Dayton Law and acted as a liaison between students, faculty and members of the administration.

Shaw has acted as the faculty coordinator for the Honorable James J. Gilvary Symposium on Law, Religion and Social Justice. She authored a bimonthly column on legal ethics in the American Bar Association's *Student Lawyer* and previously co-wrote a regular column for the *Columbus Bar*

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Journal. She is a recipient of the TWEN Award for Innovation in Teaching from West Group and in 2006 received her second national award from the American Society of Business Publication editors.

Shaw served as a law clerk for the Honorable Walter H. Rice, U.S. District Court Judge for the Southern District of Ohio, Western Division.

Having received both of her degrees from the University of Dayton, Shaw '83, '87 found the diction to return campus to teach an easy one.

Session 6A **Rising From the Ashes and Dust: Building Better Library Services While They're Literally Building You a Better Library**

The Law Library at the University of Kentucky will be undergoing a renovation and will be in temporary housing with little to no access to the physical collection for over a year. The challenge for the law library is to continue to serve students, faculty, and the public and to retain the loyalty of the library's patrons while working inside a smaller space without access to many books. While this program discusses the law library's plans to deal with these issues, the scope is broader than the issues of just one library. The program aims to review the ways that historical and contemporary libraries have dealt with limited space and limited access to books. By looking at how libraries dealt with these limitations, we can find ways to build better libraries that can be used not only in times of hardship, but also when physical space and collections are plentiful.

Amelia Landenberger, Outreach Services Librarian, University of Kentucky College of Law

Amelia Landenberger is the Outreach Librarian at the University of Kentucky Law Library. She is a graduate of three universities in Ohio, with a B.A. in French from Case Western Reserve University, a J.D. from The Ohio State University, and an M.L.I.S. from Kent State University. Amelia spent the 2015-2016 academic year working as the Law Library Fellow at the University of Colorado's William A. Wise Law Library in Boulder, Colorado. Prior to that she gained experience working in five different libraries, including a law library, a medical school library, and her local public library

Beau Steenken joined the Law Library Faculty at the University of Kentucky in September 2010.

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Session 6B **Building Betting Collections: LMAs – Should they Stay or Should they Go?**

Legal publishers have offered Library Maintenance Agreements as a means of regularizing billing, discounting costs, and capping increases for print continuations. Terms and conditions of LMAs have evolved over the years, as have the needs of libraries. Some law school libraries no longer

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subscribe to print reporters, relying instead on Bloomberg Law, Fastcase, LexisNexis, Westlaw and government web resources for comprehensive access to court decisions and other primary sources. At the same time, legal research and writing programs are transitioning to a format-neutral or digital-only approach to teaching students. The academic law library directors on this panel will share their experiences and discuss specific considerations in evaluating their libraries' LMAs in view of these changes. Do these agreements still align with the library's collection development practices? Do they continue to support the law school's legal education program?

Virginia Thomas, Director, Arthur Neef Law Library, Wayne State University

Virginia C. Thomas, AM, MBA, JD, CAA, has served as Director of the Arthur Neef Law Library at Wayne State University since 2009. Currently, she serves on the State Bar of Michigan Libraries, Legal Research, and Legal Publications Committee and is an Executive Committee member of the Michigan Institute for Continuing Legal Education.

Patrick Meyer, Associate Professor and Director, Kresge Law Library, University of Detroit Mercy

Patrick Meyer is Associate Professor and Director of Kresge Law Library at the University of Detroit Mercy, where he manages the library budget, has primary responsibility for the development of the collection, and fosters the creation of services to faculty and students. He has taught extensively for nearly 20 years and teaches several sections of Advanced Legal Research each year in online and traditional formats. Professor Meyer oversees the development of and co-teaches a new required first semester course titled Introduction to Legal Research & Communication. He serves as Chair of the Curriculum Committee after serving as Vice Chair for two years. He is also a member of the Budget Committee and chairs the Library Committee. His scholarship focus is on legal research requirements of new attorneys, online teaching, and curricular issues.

Patrick is the Immediate Past President of the Michigan Association of Law Libraries (MichALL) and serves on the Executive Board of the Society of Academic Law Library Directors (SALLD). He was previously President of the Southern California Association of Law Libraries (SCALL) and served on the SCALL Board for five years. He has made numerous presentations on law firm legal research requirements, teaching an integrated research course, and new library space planning.

Rick Goheen, Assistant Dean and Associate Professor, LaValley Law Library, University of Toledo College of Law

Rick Goheen is Assistant Dean for the LaValley Law Library and Associate Professor at the University of Toledo College of Law. He teaches Advanced Legal Research and has been law library director at UT since 2007. He served as reference librarian, interim head of information access, and head of reference at the University of Cincinnati from 1995 to 2001. From 2001 to 2007, Professor Goheen was the founding Associate Director for Public Services at the University of St. Thomas' Schoenecker Law Library in Minnesota. He has served as treasurer of the Ohio Regional Association of Law Libraries since 2009, and chaired the host committee for ORALL's 2013 annual meeting in Toledo.

His research interests include family law, juvenile law, and legislative history. He is co-editor of Academic Law Library Job Descriptions for Use with the AALL Salary Survey (published every two years and consulted by law librarians and their employers nationwide) and is working on a history of legal publishing in Ohio from 1795 to the present. Prof. Goheen holds a BA from the University of Toledo, a JD from the University of Cincinnati, and an MSLS from the University of Kentucky.

Phebe Huderson-Poydras, Associate Dean for Library Affairs and Assistant Professor of Law, Indiana Tech Law School

Phebe Huderson-Poydras is the founding Associate Dean for Library Affairs and Assistant Professor of Law at Indiana Tech Law School. Professor Huderson-Poydras is responsible for the overall management of the library. Prior to joining Indiana Tech Law School, she was the Director of the Florida A& M University College of Law Library. She has taught Professionalism, Advanced Legal Research, Legal Research and Legal Methods. Huderson-Poydras received a Master in Library and Information Science from Louisiana State University in 1998 and a Juris Doctor from Southern University Law Center in 1995.

Session 7 Thinking Outside the Library Walls: Reaching Out to Our Patrons

The shift from print to digital has required librarians to continually evolve. As library walls shrink, how are libraries expanding services to reach patrons who don't enter the physical library, or simply think libraries are irrelevant? A panel of librarians will discuss ways in which law libraries can reach their patrons beyond the physical locale of the law library. Panelists will discuss ideas for bringing the "library" to the patrons.

Michael Whiteman, Associate Dean for Law Library Services & Information Technology, Northern Kentucky University, Chase College of Law

Dean Whiteman came to Chase/NKU in July, 2002. His responsibilities include overall planning and operations of the Law Library and technology within the College of Law as well as law school budgeting, facilities, and personnel. He coordinates the research component of the Basic Legal Skills course, teaches basic and advanced legal research, as well as Criminal Law. Dean Whiteman's research interests include the impact of technology on the practice of law. His most recent publications include: *Appellate Jurisprudence in the Internet Age*, 14 Nw. J. Tech. & Intell. Prop. (Forthcoming 2016).

Dean Whiteman received his B.A. from Concordia University in Montreal, Canada, his Juris Doctorate from the University of Louisville, and his Master of Science in Library and Information Science from Simmons College. He is a member of the Massachusetts Bar.

Angela Baldree, Director, Franklin County Law Library

Angela T. Baldree has been the director of the Franklin County Law Library since July 2013. Prior to that, she served as the director of the Lake County Law Library for eleven years. She has also

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served as the executive director of the Statewide Consortium of Ohio County Law Libraries. Angela is currently the Vice President/President Elect of the Ohio Regional Association of Law Libraries where she previously served as Secretary. As a member of ORALL she was on the Local Arrangements Committee for the 2014 Annual Meeting in Columbus, and has served as Chair of the Government Relations Committee, Chair of the County Law Library Special Interest Group, and has presented at the 2005, 2008, 2010, 2011, and 2015 Annual Meetings. In 2008 she became the liaison for the Coalition in Support of Ohio's Law Libraries. Angela has been a member of the AALL and its Government Relations committee and coordinated the Legislative Advocacy Program in 2008 as well as presented at the annual meeting in 2009. She traveled to Taiwan in 2010 as a member of the Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange where she toured several public and private libraries and in 2011 traveled to Havana, Cuba to attend the Havana International Book Fair.
